Where it all began: Officers and their mental health

I consider my first year in the chapter as VPM as a real beginning in many journeys for me. It was the beginning of my interest in the Southwest District and becoming a part of Kappa Kappa Psi as a national organization. However, it was also the beginning of a time when I needed to seek help because of the strain I was put through. I currently love being SWD VPM and part of the curriculum committee, but my chapter positions tend to take a real toll on my mental health. Over the past few years I've been VPM, Historian/Ritual Chair, and Alumni Relations Officer for my chapter. So far, the least draining has been my current chapter position as ARO, but other positions where I directly interact and serve the chapter have made me seek help and counseling through my university. I write about this not to complain and vent, but to encourage other chapter officers to seek help when needed and for chapters to be grateful for all the work their officers do. It's hard for chapter officers to feel appreciated when they have people upset at them for whatever reason every week when they're the ones putting in extra hours each week on top of ensembles, academics, and just trying to take care of themselves. It's even harder when those are the same people not showing up to chapter and complaining that meetings are too long.

A common saying is "You're not here to major in Kappa Kappa Psi/Tau Beta Sigma" but I notice that very few people hold their chapter officers to this standard. While you should hold your officer accountable to do at least their bare minimum duties, expecting too much from officers can really take a toll on them when there may be so much else happening in their life. If you notice an officer struggling to fulfill their role, ask them if they need help. Maybe even getting them a cup of coffee and listening to them vent can help them be motivated and feel less alone in the chapter. I had a whole army of amazing people on my committee when I was chapter VPM, but I definitely still felt alone when I had to tell people things like they didn't get the little they wanted or that I can't change the constitution to give their friend another chance at a bid this semester. If you are considering running for an office, definitely pursue it. However, I suggest talking to the previous officer about the issues they've run into and assessing what support you may need when/if you take on this position. Having the support you need readily available throughout your term is something that you can prepare beforehand and may prevent a decline in mental health!

If you do become a chapter officer, especially one with a lot of responsibility, I suggest having a counseling appointment (or other mental health service that's appropriate for you) once a week or once every other week to ensure that you have the validation you need, healthy coping techniques and someone to help you process feedback. A counseling session may even be worth it to those who don't yet have mental health concerns because of the support and benefits it can provide to people. Also, it can be beneficial to have a counselor that you already know and like if you do need to reach out for support. Every person is different and this is not a one size fits all solution by any means, but I strongly believe that if we all encouraged our officers to take care of their mental health and went out of our way to help and support them, our fraternity and sorority would all have stronger chapters as a result. It's important that we don't make anyone feel lesser than others because of anxiety, bipolar disorder, depression, or any other mental health condition. We need to ensure that these people feel supported enough to hold an office because we as brothers and sisters need to practice what we preach about love, inclusion, and leadership.

...in Fall 2016, I was initiated into Kappa Kappa Psi. It was during a semester that I was uncertain on where I belonged in a college setting but let me backtrack some. I was a freshman at the University of New Mexico (UNM) in the Fall of 2015. I joined a social sorority, managed a brand-new student organization, working full time as a barista, and balanced 18 credit hours. I didn't dip my toe into college, I fell in. I don't regret a single part of my journey freshman year, but with everything I endured, I transferred into Arizona State University online and took a semester away.

I participated in the recruitment week as much as my schedule could allow and was initiated in November of 2016. My class, Alpha Beta, has a very special place in my heart. We were a group of eight when we were initiated. Currently, three of us remain. I could not be prouder of my class. When I got to college, I saw that same spirit of enthusiasm and service in KKPsi and TBS. And



I was head-strong on the path of becoming a pharmacist which, at the time, meant going to Chemistry 1 every morning and being surrounded by science at any given moment of the day. For some people, this would probably be a nice experience, but for me, it was literally the most exhausting and mentally draining experience of my college career. I found that the only joy I had in life was going to marching band. Music has always been an exciting part of my life and I could not imagine my life without it. However, I never imagined that it would become my career.

This decision was honestly one of the hardest ones of my life, but it truly marks the start of my career as a music educator.

Back when I was applying to college, my parents were very persistent that I needed to make a lot of money and have a high status job and, at first, I agreed with them. So, I set my sights on getting a biochemistry degree to go into pharmacy school. This career path was something that I believed was manageable, while being very high paying and for the first semester, I was actually excited about becoming a pharmacist. Then reality hit. At the beginning of my second semester, I started to hate every second of going to class. I had a very hard time with the upper level chemistry and it made me feel like I was inadequate and unintelligent. This cycle of waking up, telling myself that I could make it through the day, then going to Chem. 2 and having all of my hopes and confidence dashed in a single test grade, was exhausting. I remember hitting a very low point of wondering why I was even in college. I obviously wasn't good enough to be there. At least that's what my brain was telling me.

About halfway through the semester, I sat down to examine my life and realized that I was happiest when I was around music. At the time it was only one class, three times a week, but I lived for marching band. I couldn't wait to go do the thing that I enjoyed: music. After this realization, I had a tough decision to make, one that I believed my parents would be devastated over. I knew that it needed to be done, but I couldn't bring myself to do it.

That was until I went to my first Area Workshop as a membership candidate for Tau Beta Sigma. The Workshop was at the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville and it was one of the best experiences of my life. One in particular was the workshop that I went to about self-care and doing what's best for you. It changed everything. For the first time in so long, everything was so clear. I knew exactly what I had to do. On the way back to Tech, I called my par-

ents with tears in my eyes and told them how unhappy I was. I explained to them that I needed to change the direction that my life was going. It was the only way that I could change things for the better.

After listening to me for a couple of minutes, my parents greeted me with nothing but support and love. This was the complete opposite of how I thought they would react. It was very surprising and one of the best feelings in the world. They supported me unconditionally, just like my sister and brothers do. It was a great day.

Now I am in my junior year of becoming a Music Educator and I have never been more excited and fulfilled in my life. Doing what my heart wants has always been a struggle for me and looking back, there is very little chance I would have made it through a chemistry degree. This beginning for my career was the hardest decision I have ever had to make and it is one that I am constantly reminded of. I will never forget the weight that was lifted off my shoulders when I changed my major and how happy my heart is when I am teaching music.

I have had the privilege of hearing National VPCM Jessica Lee present at a workshop twice during my time in the fraternity. The first time was at National Convention 2019 in Stillwater, Oklahoma, and the second time was at home here at the University of Arkansas during a live chat online. This particular workshop is entitled "Honoring Outstanding Bandsmen." It is focused on challenging brothers to engage in deep thought about what it means to be a brother, the nature of our values, and what that ultimately means for our membership selection process in order to ensure the honor of our fraternity is upheld.

The first time that I heard this workshop, it was an eye-opening experience for me. Not only was the subject matter of great value to me, but the passion that I could see in the way that Jessica was delivering this message to her fellow brothers was inspiring. One of the most memorable parts of the entire workshop was her analysis of The Sinek Circle and how it applies to Kappa Kappa Psi. Jessica shared with the room her life experiences that led to her joining the brotherhood, and how once she joined, her life was forever changed. She was genuine, honest, and open with her brothers, and that affected me in a powerful way that I was not anticipating.

Essentially, Jessica's message is that Kappa Kappa Psi is about people, and people join our brotherhood because of people. That is not to say that we are a social fraternity. Rather, people join this brotherhood because of our display of an undeniable amount of passion for striving for the highest in everything that we do. Relaying the magic of what we do to people who share our ideals and values allows them to come to the realization that this organization is just what they have been looking for. The second time that I heard Jessica give this presentation, it still affected me, possibly even stronger than it did the first time. In all of the stress of life, it is sometimes easy to lose focus of what matters and hearing her share her sentiments with us for a second time hit it home for me. It helped me answer the big question that she poses to her brothers: What is your why?

For clarity, answering why you joined and remained in Kappa Kappa Psi is one of the most important moments in your time in the fraternity. To echo Jessica's sentiments, people are here because of people. Sharing your personal story allows you to connect with others in a manner unmatched. Being genuine, honest, and forthright about who you are as a person and where you come from is one of the most influential things you will ever do in your life. Brothers of Kappa Kappa Psi come from all walks of life. This fraternity is about as diverse as it gets. However, there is one thing that binds us all together: our urge to lead, serve, and come together as brothers in the pursuit of music. We hold in our hearts the values of honor, integrity, respect, and loyalty. The feeling I get even just thinking about that is indescribable.

This is my why. I encourage you to think about your why, and relay it to others, inside or outside of our organization. Who knows, it might rekindle a lost spark, or it may bring you closer to someone you might one day call a brother. At the least, I hope it highlights the magic I see in Kappa Psi every single day.

Let's go back to where it all began. When I entered the seventh grade, I thought I was "all grown up" since I was a junior high student. I was ready to fight the world. My first order of business was to figure out why I had been put in band class. "I didn't sign up for band," I thought to myself, or at least I didn't remember signing up for band. I showed up to the class and told my teacher, Mr. Skinkle, that there must have been some mistake, and that I was going to talk to the counselor to get it fixed.

My counselor told me to give her a couple of days and she would see what she could do. I reluctantly went back to the band hall and just sat quietly as everyone was trying out instruments to see where their interests lie. Mr. Skinkle tells me, "You can try it out to see if you like it, just in case." I wasn't sure about it, so I declined. After a couple of days, however, I figured I might as well try to see if it's something I would like. I tried out for percussion, flute, and low brass (trombone/baritone). I ended up on baritone, because he needed more low brass and the slide on the trombone scared me. At some point, I started to think that I might want to stay.

My counselor came to my science class around the end of that week and told me that she had fixed gotten me out. Here's the kicker: I changed my mind. In front of my teacher and my whole class, I sat there and said, "Actually, I think I want to stay." She made me swear that this is what I wanted, because she wouldn't do this again. I told her that it was, and that was that.

At first, I didn't take it very seriously. I would goof off more than I should have, but I was always decent at it. I started to take it more seriously in my second year after I tried out at all region just for fun and ended up making a band. After that, I became much more involved. I owe so much to my development as a person to band, because once I started to take it more seriously, band became my life. My band director taught me so many valuable life lessons, as well as helped me reach my potential as a musician.

Among the lessons Mr. Skinkle taught me was how to be a leader, being willing to put in extra effort, personal responsibility, how to work with a group... the list goes on. Many of the lessons I learned during the membership process for Kappa Kappa Psi, I learned from Mr. Skinkle first. It's pretty telling that I later learned that he had been presented a bid from the Kappa Kappa Psi Chapter at his alma mater, which he (begrudgingly to me) declined.

Additionally, we had to help out the band program for our grade, such as loading instruments for away games and picking up trash after home games. Interestingly enough, though, I would always do more than I had to. It wasn't **just** for a grade; I genuinely wanted to help out and do more. I feel like I owe a lot of that to Mr. Skinkle, because while that feeling has to come from me, it seems like he was the one who helped me see that.

Suddenly, high school was over. I had been Drum Major, principle euphonium, went to numerous clinics, took lessons, and overall loved band. I hadn't been sure until my senior year of high school what I was going to study at college, but after I thought about it, it seemed pretty clear that I was meant to dedicate my life to music. I applied for the music program at the University of Arkansas, and luckily enough, I was accepted.

I got to the U of A to be a part of the Best in Sight and Sound, and the first thing I thought was, "Oh man, this is scary." I came from a town with population 2,000 people, and my graduating class was right around 80. Not considering the Fayetteville population, the university population alone was over 20,000. What a culture shock. So, once I started hearing whispers of some organization called "Kappa Kappa Psi," I wasn't having it. It was a fraternity, and I had heard about fraternities in high school. My section leaders had joked about it and kind of persuaded me not to join. I also just didn't know exactly what it was all about, so I didn't pay it much mind. Oddly enough, however, many of my friends happened to be members of the organization.

One of those friends was a member of my section, Alle Holcomb. She, and others, had asked me about Kappa Kappa Psi before, but I just wasn't interested. Luckily enough, they decided not to give up on me. Close to the end of my first semester, Alle called me in the morning and told me, "I have something I want to give you later. Can you meet me in the band hall?" I was kind of surprised, but I accepted. Later that day, she pulled me into one of our rehearsal halls and handed me an envelope. "I know you said you weren't interested, but Kappa Kappa Psi would really like for you to consider accepting a bid."

I was shocked. At that point, I knew at least a little bit about it through my friends, so I knew that they were an organization that supported band programs at the university. I consulted my family, my friends in Kappa Kappa Psi, a couple of friends from Tau Beta Sigma, and some friends from outside the organizations. I valued all types of opinions in this situation. At the end of it all, it seemed like it was worth it to at least try since they did so many things that I had done in high school in the name of bettering band programs. If I didn't like the fit, it had been made very clear to me that I could drop at any time, so I thought, "Why not?"

That was before Christmas break. Over the next few months, my life was a roller coaster ride, and honestly one of the hardest parts of my life. I had been in a car accident a few weeks before school let out. I wasn't as ready for the spring semester as I had been for fall. Although I had friends, I still didn't know anyone super well. Then, with all of that in mind, I had to deal with the hardest situation of my life: my parents' divorce. It finally hit me that my whole life was changing, and it wasn't waiting for me.

I came back for the spring, and Kappa Kappa Psi was there waiting for me. I joined the Epsilon Beta Membership Class of the Lambda Chapter of Kappa Kappa Psi, not really knowing what it would hold for me. However, despite all of my hardships, what transpired over the course of that semester is something I will never forget. I met people who I would one day call brothers and sisters, I experienced situations I would have never imagined, and I was given the privilege of joining a secure order that was composed of ideals and values that I had been passionate about my entire life. My brothers and sisters, as well as this fraternity have been such a powerful positive influence in my life, and I can't even really explain it all. All I know is that I would do literally anything for them. I trust them with my life.

My commitment to my brothers and sisters, as well as the overall fraternity, is something I do not take lightly. I have seen what we can do at our best, and honestly, it brings me to tears sometimes. They aren't sad tears, or even happy tears really. Just tears...

I don't know if I can explain it in words, but I'm going to try my hardest. It's the feeling you get when you see the wonder in a young child's eye as he watches us playing our instruments and, in that moment, he makes the decision to one day be a musician. The feeling you get when you see the hope and peace come over your elders as they see hope and security in future generations. The feeling you get when you see the pride in your directors and fellow bandsmen in the performances that you have worked tirelessly on. It all brings me that same potent feeling. I think if I had to describe it in one sentence, it would be this: It is seeing yourself make the world a better place, one person or one situation at a time.

The only reason I am able to do that is because of this amalgamation of crazy events one after another. Barely staying in band before I even started, and now I'm well on my way to becoming a band director. Being afraid to attend the University of Arkansas and coming to realize it's the only place I want to be. Not showing any interest in an organization which I am now fully committed to, which I see myself being committed to for the rest of my life. When I think about all of that, all I can do is be thankful that I'm right where I need to be. To quote someone I met recently, "My passion is to help other people find and fulfill their passion." I am more than content with that.

Hopefully now it's clear why I describe our organization as magical. The word "magic" may seem dramatic, but to me, that's exactly what it is. We have chapters full of people all across the United States of America, with the chance to be a positive influence in people's live every single day. Even the smallest things to us could be the biggest things to someone else. We have the chance to lift people up and inspire them to be the best that they can be, and to me, that is magical. If you do not take anything else away from my story, remember this, because I will never forget it: no matter what we do or how much we get done, if people are not at the core of what we do, then it is all for nothing. We cannot lose the magic in what we do, lest we turn away from the purposes of our organization. There is a word that a brother used to describe our fraternity once that I will never forget. Simply put, she called Kappa Kappa Psi a "light." May our light shine even in the darkness. So, with all of this in mind, what is your why? I challenge you to find the answer to that question, because frankly, it might change your life.

Halloween Headquarters



TBS at a Small School

Most, if not all, chapters have faced challenges in the recruitment process. While there is a Guide to Membership, there is no penultimate way to recruit. All chapters and schools are diverse and what works for one school may not work for another. This article details recruitment processes and events that worked for the Delta Phi chapter at Texas Lutheran University.

Delta Phi had to completely revamp their MEP two years ago, but even more importantly, we had to revamp how we communicated and worked as a chapter. When we began this journey, the chapter had nine active members. At this point we looked at each other and had to ask two questions: "How do we make ourselves more present?" and "How do we maintain our bond?" We knew we needed to increase recruitment, but we wanted to recruit quality members, not just numbers (but that would be a plus).

The first, and possibly simplest step, was being visible. We wore letters as often as possible: on chapter meeting days; to any extra band events such as pep rehearsals or performances, equipment moves, sporting events, community outreach, and while working concessions. When a member or members had a professional opportunity that placed them in front of the band such as conducting, we would encourage them to wear their letters or active pin. We would take our letters to football games for tailgating and to sit alongside the football field during the game. We would sing and chant after almost every football game and band concert. Chapter members would post on social media anytime we did any kind of service or anytime we'd spend time together, and we started doing weekly member shout outs on social member to praise different members for their personal or academic achievements.

We placed an emphasis on being personable and approachable. It was important to befriend people without talking about the sorority to get to know people and to see if they upheld the essential factors and qualities that we embody. Our next focus was on hosting events, a mix between service and social (where we would proudly wear letters), as often as possible. Each member made a point to personally invite potential members to the events, as we were still working to be as personable as possible. We made sure to advertise two to three weeks in advance for every event: we created Facebook events and invited everyone in band, created posters, and made announcements after every rehearsal.

None of this would have been possible without every member stepping up and playing key roles in every event and activity. This was achieved through effective and open lines of communication, with fun and relaxing bonding with the active members, and every member passionately working to improve our chapter.
