Women In Music Careers

My name is Ginger Miller and I am a member of the Tau Beta Sigma-Delta Eta membership class of the Delta chapter at the University of Oklahoma. I am currently a first year music education major. While in my membership education classes, there was a lot of discussion surrounding Tau Beta Sigma's mission of empowering women in the music field. As a female (future) music educator, this topic really hits close to home. Growing up, I only had male band directors and honor band clinicians. I did not have a female band director until my senior year of high school. Somewhere around that time, after having a conversation with her about wanting to major in music, it struck me how much of a male-dominated field it is. Of course, like most fields of study, the role of women is growing very quickly as more and more of us explore career paths that were formerly male-dominated. However, there is still an idea in some people's minds that certain jobs or careers are really only for men to handle. While I have no experience of what it's like as a woman in other fields, I have certainly been treated differently than my male peers by some music educators because I am a young woman in music education. We are no longer prevented from going down the paths that we choose, but we are still treated differently than our male peers and that can sometimes feel downright degrading. Our generation; however, can be and will be the ones to change that. Tau Beta Sigma holds a platform that supports and puts a voice to the women in this field and by using this said platform to encourage women and girls to pursue a career in music, we can hopefully change the treatment of women in the music field, making it a safe environment to flourish in.

a human in a suit.




Tuba - Apollo

When I turned eighteen, I was terrified of getting a credit card. I needed to practice spending within a monthly budget before I could manage credit. I spent years simply using a debit card and putting aside money in a savings account when possible. It wasn't until my senior year of college, when I needed to purchase a new laptop, that I considered getting a credit card. It was time for me to start building a reputable credit history, and I had proven my ability to spend money within a monthly income. My first credit card was the "Discover Student Card." It gave me a lower credit limit, and I did not need a significant monthly income to qualify for the card, which was necessary because I was only working part-time.

I used this Student Card responsibly for years, and I established a good credit score which gave lenders faith in me to pay back loans for a car, house, and large purchases. The Discover Student Card had a cashback bonus which meant I could earn 1-5% of my purchases back in cash or credit toward a future billing cycle. While this program was a good starting program, I wanted to take my spending power to the next level. In 2017, I applied for a second credit card, this time through American Airlines.

Once you've established a reputable credit score, you then have more options as to which credit card company you would like to have an account. Each company has different account levels and rewards programs offered. One common reward is 0% financing at retail stores. For example, if you need to purchase a new washer or dryer, or perhaps a new laptop, a Best Buy credit card could be offering a promotion on 0% financing for an extended period of time. This means you'd be able to pay off that purchase without accruing interest for the specified amount of time. However, you must be careful because if you are not able to pay off the full amount, you might be responsible for a compounded interest rate that has been building since the initial purchase. If paid off in time, credit cards through retail stores could be helpful for large, one-time purchases.

Cash back reward programs are also a common bonus for many credit cards. This means that for every dollar you spend, you will earn a specified percent of that money back. These programs may offer a greater cash-back percentage dependent upon what times you purchase or where. This cash-back could then be saved and used toward a fun, future expense or could help you make a payment on a monthly bill in a pinch. Many credit cards offer this program including Discover, American Express, Chase, Capitol One, Visa, and Master Card.

Other reward programs help you mitigate travel costs, such as earning miles for flights or hotel points. I have the American Airlines credit card, and for every dollar I spend, I earn miles. These miles can then be traded for airline tickets. Delta, Southwest, United, and other airlines also have credit cards where you can earn miles through their specific airline. Discover, Capitol One, American Express, and others also have reward programs where you can earn miles. It's important to do your research to see what airline you fly most often, or which ones have the best reward program for you.

Another way to earn points toward travel is through hotel credit cards or simply hotel membership programs. I am a member of the International Hotel Group (IHG), and this is not a credit card program. This simply means that anytime I stay at an IHG hotel, including Holiday Inn, Staybridge, and Candlewood Suites, I earn points. Of course, if you have their credit card, you earn more points and faster, but I have not taken that step. However, hotel reward programs or credit cards are great ways to accrue points that can be traded in for free nights. Marriott, Hilton, Hyatt, and Best Western are just some of the many hotel groups that offer these programs.

Everyone's credit score and history are different, which is why it is vital for you to do your own research to see what your best options are when it comes to rewards programs. I am, by no means, an expert in finances, and it's important to figure out what is best for you. However, it can be incredibly rewarding to reap the rewards from necessary expenses. This past month, I had the opportunity to go to France with my mother. I traded in airlines miles I had been saving for a free, round-trip flight to France. My mother, who travels for work, had saved enough IHG points with her IHG credit card to trade in her points and cover our lodging costs. She also used her airline miles to pay for her flight. This means that for both of us, our transportation and lodging costs were covered through credit card rewards programs. It took us two years to save enough points, but it was possible and worth it!
